History of Bittersweet

American bittersweet (*Celastrus scandens* L.) is a twining, woody vine that scrambles over low vegetation or trails along the ground. It can climb 20 feet. This strong, hearty, and enduring plant is exactly the type of foundation needed for our club.

The dark green leaves of the **Bittersweet** are oval, finely toothed, smooth and two to four inches long. Clusters of small yellowish-green flowers bloom in May or June and can often be spotted along banks of streams or in moist thickets.

Fruit of the **Bittersweet** is a dull orange, ball-shaped capsule that splits open in September, exposing the bright scarlet, fleshy-coated seeds. The fruit is eaten by several species of birds and other wildlife.

Bittersweet depicts our club: A strong organization dedicated to the conservation of our streams and the protection of our wildlife.

Club Objectives

The objectives of this club shall be: to study the basic art of gardening; to promote interest in and knowledge of horticulture, gardening, and civic beautification; to encourage conservation of our natural resources; and to cooperate with other clubs and agencies, which have interest in horticulture and conservation.

Conservation Pledge

I pledge to protect and conserve the natural resources of the planet Earth and promise to promote education so we may become caretakers of our air, water, forests, land, and wildlife.

BITTERSWEET GARDEN CLUB BYLAWS

Amended and Approved September 18, 2025

Article I - Name

The name of this organization shall be Bittersweet Garden Club.

Article II - Objectives

The objectives of this club shall be: To study the basic art of gardening; to promote an interest and knowledge of horticulture, gardening and civic beautification; to encourage conservation of our natural resources; and to cooperate with other clubs and agencies which have interest in horticulture and conservation.

Article III - Standing Rules

The business of the club shall be conducted in accordance with the Standing Rules as adopted by the membership. Adoption requires a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the Active members voting.

Article IV - Membership

There shall be two categories of membership: Active and Emeritus.

Section 1. Active membership shall be limited to 90 members. Exceptions to the limit shall be homeowners whose garden is on tour during the current year or Emeritus members who choose to reinstate their active membership.

- A. To be a member in good standing, (s)he must have a desire to further the interest of horticulture and conservation, take an active interest in the club, and be current with club dues.
- B. Membership is granted when an applicant pays dues.

Section 2. Active members may request Emeritus membership provided they have been an Active member in good standing for a minimum of 10 years. Emeritus members:

- A. Must pay annual dues by October 1.
- B. May attend up to two meetings per year. They may also be invited to attend special activities or meetings.
- C. Do not have voting privileges.
- D. Will not be reported as a member of the district, state, and national garden clubs. If a member wishes to retain those memberships, they must reimburse the club for the amount of the total dues.
- E. May not hold office in the club.

Article V - Dues

Section 1. The fiscal year of the club shall be from January 1 through December 31 of the same year.

Section 2. Active members' annual dues shall include district, state, and national dues. The membership year shall be October 1 to September 30.

Section 3. Annual dues are payable to the club Treasurer prior to October 1 of each year. Members failing to remit by October 1 shall be notified that they are delinquent. If dues are not paid by October 15, membership will be forfeited.

Article VI - Officers

Section 1. The officers of this club shall be: President, Vice President of Programs, Vice President of Activities, Vice President of Fundraising, Secretary, and Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the Executive Board.

Section 2. The President shall preside at all meetings, call special meetings, appoint necessary chairpersons, and carry out all duties which pertain to this office.

Section 3. The Vice President of Programs shall be chairperson of the Program Committee and shall perform the duties of the President in his/her absence.

Section 4. The Vice President of Activities shall be chairperson of the Activity Committee and shall perform the duties of the Vice President of Programs in his/her absence.

Section 5. The Vice President of Fundraisers shall be chairperson of the annual fundraiser and shall perform the duties of the Vice President of Activities in his/her absence.

Section 6. The Secretary shall keep minutes of meetings, both special and regular, and shall take care of all correspondence.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall collect all dues for membership and shall pay all bills. By October 25, (s)he shall mail all required dues to the state and district Treasurers.

Section 8. The Compliance Officer is an appointed position designated by the Executive Board and shall be reaffirmed annually. The Compliance Officer shall be responsible for ensuring the organization remains in good standing with State and Federal regulatory agencies.

Section 9. In the case of an officer vacancy, the Executive Board may appoint a replacement.

Article VII - Meetings

Section 1. Regular meetings of this club shall be held on the third Thursday of each month unless otherwise scheduled by the President.

Section 2. Where necessary, *Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised* shall govern the club.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the President upon reasonable notice given to all members.

Section 4. Each Active member present and in good standing shall have one vote.

Section 5. The regular meeting in September shall be known as the Annual Meeting and shall be for the purpose of electing officers.

Section 6. Installation of officers shall be held at the regular meeting in January. Officers shall take office following their installation.

Section 7. Any motions presented at meetings shall be determined by a simple majority of the Active members voting.

Article VIII - Committees

Project and standing committee members for the following year shall be solicited beginning in September of the current year. The President may establish additional committees.

Article IX - Dissolution

Section 1. The Bittersweet Garden Club shall remain a non-profit organization under the 501(c)(3) status in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code.

Section 2. In the event of dissolution of this club, and after payment of all bills, the assets shall be transferred to a local non-profit organization whose purpose is to further the interest of horticulture and conservation. The allocation of funds will be determined by the current membership at the time of dissolution.

Article X - Amendments to Bylaws

These bylaws may be amended at any regular business meeting of the club, provided the amendment(s) have been submitted and read at the previous regular business meeting. Amendment passage requires a two-thirds (2/3) majority of Active members voting, providing the number of voting members constitutes a quorum. A quorum is defined as a simple majority of the current Active membership.

BITTERSWEET GARDEN CLUB STANDING RULES

Amended and Approved September 18, 2025

I. MEETINGS

- A. Meetings are the third Thursday of each month unless otherwise specified.
- B. Meetings begin with a social time, including food and beverage, at 6:00 p.m., followed by a program and business meeting beginning at 6:30 p.m.
- C. A \$50 stipend is offered to non-member program presenters.
- D. Host/co-hosts
 - 1. Each Active member is expected to serve as a host or co-host three times per year. A signup sheet will be made available in August and September for the following year.
 - 2. Host/co-host duties include bringing food and beverages, setting up the meeting room, setting up the serving area, and leaving the building as we found it.
 - 3. Each co-host is responsible for bringing a dish to serve 16.
 - 4. When unable to fulfill host/co-host responsibilities, Active members are expected to arrange for a substitute and notify the host of the change.
- E. Members should check off their name on the attendance sheet, which is distributed by the Secretary at meetings.
- F. Minutes are taken by the Secretary and are distributed via email as soon as possible after meetings. Active members are invited to review and suggest additions and/or corrections before the minutes are accepted into the record.
- G. Active members who are present at meetings may vote on motions presented. Under certain circumstances, voting may be allowed electronically. A motion will be passed by a simple majority of the Active members voting.
- H. Emeritus members and non-members may attend up to two meetings per year.

II. ELECTIONS

- A. A Nominating Committee consisting of the current President and four past Presidents shall propose a slate of officers for the following year. Active members are welcome to submit a name for consideration to the committee.
- B. The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of officers to the membership at the August meeting. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor.
- C. Elections will be held at the September meeting. Officers are elected by a simple majority of the Active members voting.

III. OFFICERS

- A. Officers are President, Vice President of Programs, Vice President of Activities, Vice President of Fundraisers, Secretary, and Treasurer. These officers constitute the Executive Board.
- B. Officers are elected for a term of one year.
- C. A list of officer responsibilities is maintained by the Executive Board.
- D. The outgoing President is presented with an engraved commemorative stone.

IV. MEMBERSHIP

- A. There shall be two categories of membership: Active and Emeritus.
 - 1. Active Membership
 - a) Active membership shall be limited to 90 members. Invitations to new members will be extended when openings occur. Exceptions to the limit shall be homeowners whose garden is on tour during the current year or Emeritus members who choose to reinstate their Active membership.
 - b) Mentors are assigned to new Active members to help familiarize them with our yearbook, meetings and activities, our web page, and to facilitate introductions to ensure they feel welcome.

c) To be a member in good standing, a member must: have a desire to further the interest of horticulture and conservation, be current with club dues, have signed and submitted the "Acknowledgement of Risk and Release of Responsibility" form, and take an active interest in the club, which may include:

1. attending monthly meetings
2. hosting or co-hosting at least three times per year
3. assisting with civic beautification projects (e.g. Memorial Park or others)
4. serving on a committee
5. assisting with the annual fundraiser

d) Each new member is given a nametag paid for by club funds. The Treasurer orders a name tag immediately after a new member pays dues. Replacement nametags will be at the member's expense.

2. Emeritus Membership

a) Active members may submit a request for Emeritus membership to the president providing they have been an Active member in good standing for a minimum of 10 years. Emeritus members:

1. Must pay annual dues by October 1
2. Will not be reported as a member of the district, state, and national garden clubs. If a member wishes to retain those memberships, they must reimburse the club for the amount of the total dues.
3. May attend up to two meetings per year. They may also be invited to attend special activities or meetings
4. Are exempt from serving as a host or co-host at meetings
5. Will receive copies of minutes, treasurer's reports, budgets, and all other club communications
6. Will receive a copy of the club's yearbook
7. Do not have voting privileges
8. May not hold office in the club
9. Are exempt from participating in fundraisers
10. Are exempt from serving on committees
11. May participate in club activities only after all interested Active members have registered. Then, if there are still openings, Emeritus members will have the opportunity to register followed by non-member guests.

b) Emeritus members may reinstate their Active membership at any time upon request and may do so prior to any proposed new member.

B. The History Committee chair maintains a database of members' information including members' full names, addresses, emails, phone numbers, photos, year joined, emergency contact information, and Master Gardener status.

C. The History Committee chair maintains a waitlist of prospective members which includes date received, name, contact information, and current member (if any) who submitted name. Membership opportunities will be made available in the order the names were received.

D. Personal member information is included in the yearbook but is not shared on our website or anywhere else outside of the club.

E. Yearbook design and printing is managed by the Yearbook chair and is paid for by club funds. In December, each member receives a yearbook which includes a list of meetings and activities, a member directory, project and committee descriptions, and other pertinent information.

F. Memorial gifts will be extended for deceased members only and will be limited to \$100. Sympathy cards will be sent to members who have suffered the loss of a spouse, child, grandchild, or sibling.

V. PROJECTS AND COMMITTEES

A. A list of project and committee descriptions is included in the yearbook.

B. Active members may sign up for projects and committees in August and September for the following year.

STANDING RULES—CONTINUED

- C. A full list of project and committee responsibilities is maintained by the Executive Board.

VI. ACTIVITIES

- A. A list of activities is included in the yearbook.
- B. Activities are open to all Active members followed by Emeritus members, if space is available
- C. Due to space constraints, maximum participation limits may be determined by the V.P. of Activities.
- D. Members may invite guests after all Active and Emeritus members have had sufficient time to sign up, providing there is space available.
- E. Invited guests must be accompanied by a member. No one under the age of twenty-one will be included as a guest on a Bittersweet trip.
- F. Guests may be charged an increased participation fee.
- G. Registration
 - 1. Members may register for activities through an online signup form.
 - 2. Advance notice will be given to members prior to opening registration for activities when demand is expected to exceed available space.
 - 3. Registrations will be accepted in the order they are received.
 - 4. Once maximum registration is reached, a waitlist will be maintained to be referenced in the event of cancellations.
 - 5. Registrations will be completed when payment is made in full.
 - 6. Activity payments are generally non-refundable. Any expenses the club is able to recoup may be returned to the member or guest. Trip refunds of \$25 or less will not be made and will remain in the Activities account.
 - 7. If a member or guest has paid in full for an activity and is unable to attend, they must contact the V.P. of Activities. If there is someone on the waitlist who is able to participate, a refund may be possible.
- H. Contracts for activities shall be signed by the President or by the V.P. of Activities with the President's authorization.
- I. All members and guests taking part in Bittersweet Garden Club activities must sign an "Acknowledgement of Risk and Release of Liability Form" prior to participation.

VII. FINANCIAL

- A. Dues
 - 1. Annual dues for Active members are \$50 and are payable to the club Treasurer prior to October 1 of each year. The membership year shall be October 1 to September 30. Annual dues for Emeritus members are \$20 unless the member wishes to remain a member of Federated Garden Club, in which case dues will be what active members pay. Active and Emeritus members failing to remit by October 1 shall be notified that they are delinquent. If dues are not paid by October 15, membership will be forfeited.
 - 2. Dues may be raised at any regular business meeting of the club by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the quorum, provided the proposal has been submitted at the previous regular business meeting. A quorum is defined as a simple majority of the current membership.
 - 3. If approved, any change in dues will take effect beginning the following year.
- B. Budget
 - The incoming Executive Board will electronically send Active and Emeritus members a proposed budget prior to the January meeting. The budget must be approved at the January meeting by a simple majority of the Active members voting.
- C. Expenditures
 - 1. Proposed expenses not itemized in the budget must be approved by a majority of Active members in attendance at a business meeting.

2. Payment/Reimbursement
 - a) To pay a vendor directly, an Active member must submit a payment request form to the Treasurer.
 - b) To be reimbursed for expenses incurred, an Active member must submit a reimbursement request form to the Treasurer.
 - c) To request a credit card payment, an Active member must submit a credit card approval form to the Treasurer.
 - d) Payment/Reimbursement forms are available from the Treasurer and on the Bittersweet Garden Club website.
3. Checking Accounts
 - a) There are two checking accounts: a Club account for all club-related expenses and an Activity account for optional activities.
 - b) Two signers are required for checks for \$250 or more. Checks over \$250 will be co-signed by both the Treasurer and President.
 - c) Both checking accounts will undergo a review by the Audit Committee in January of each year.
 - d) Online access to the bank accounts in View-Only mode may be given to the Auditor and the VP of Activities. The President and the Treasurer will have full access to online bank accounts.
4. Credit Card
 - a) The club credit card is issued in the name of Bittersweet Garden Club and the current President.
 - b) The credit card may only be used for club-related expenses.
 - c) Any cash-back earned from credit card use will be deposited into the Activity account.
- D. Bittersweet Garden Club is registered as a non-profit corporation with the Missouri Secretary of State's Office. This registration must be renewed in August every two years. It is the responsibility of the Compliance Officer to file the biennial registration in accordance with State requirements. The Compliance Officer shall have access to all necessary financial and organizational records in order to fulfill these duties.

VIII. FUNDRAISERS

- A. Bittersweet Garden Club holds a tour of gardens in the Jefferson City area as a club fundraiser. Other fundraisers may be considered in addition to or in lieu of a garden tour. Proceeds fund our community initiatives such as: scholarships offered to area students, garden therapy workshops, K-12 teacher grants, gardening resources, as well as the club's other activities.
- B. All members are expected to participate in the annual fundraiser(s).
- C. For garden tours, a preview tour is held the Thursday prior to the garden tour, and is for Bittersweet Garden Club Active members and current tour homeowners only. Potential exceptions must be approved by the President and the Garden Tour Chair. Emeritus members may be invited to the preview tour.

IX. WEBSITE & FACEBOOK PRESENCE

- A. The Website and Facebook Committee chair maintains the website which contains club information, upcoming activities, necessary forms, garden tour information, scholarship forms, and other pertinent information.
- B. The Website and Facebook Committee chair maintains the Facebook page, posting information and photos of activities.

X. FEDERATED GARDEN CLUBS OF MISSOURI (FGCM) – Bittersweet Garden Club has been an affiliate member of FGCM since August 1973. This affiliation includes membership in National Garden Club (NGC), NGC Central Region, and FGCM Central District.

XI. STANDING RULE AMENDMENTS – The standing rules will remain in force from the time of adoption until they are amended or repealed. They may be amended or repealed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of Active members voting, provided a thirty-day notice has been given.

2026 PERENNIAL PLANT OF THE YEAR

Andropogon gerardii 'Blackhawks'

Common Name: Blackhawks big bluestem



With near-black coloration and a strong vertical habit, 'Blackhawks' big bluestem adds drama to the fall garden. Foliage emerges dark green, developing reddish-purple tips as the summer progresses. In August, three-parted "turkeyfoot" inflorescences arise and by September the leaves, stems, and blooms take on a deep purple hue. More compact than other big bluestem cultivars, 'Blackhawks' reaches five feet tall by two feet wide.
